





Results



- **1035** assaulted journalists/ media workers in total
 - **815** assaults
 - **220** deaths

2. Developing a list of relevant organizations and choosing the relevant documents from their archives.

a. Following the structure of given organization's outlets (resolutions > report > press release, etc.) and going from top to bottom to identify documents that fit the following criteria:

- i. Should explicitly concern media workers and not civilians in general
- ii. European or world-wide scope (not documents that concern only other parts of the world) – only safety of journalists working in Europe, or also European journalists working in other places?

primary definition	assassination	accident	suicide
exact definition	shot/gunned down (intentional e.g. by a sniper or other gunmen)	crossfire (not intentional, e.g. during a confrontation between police and a criminal; wounded by shrapnel)	plausible
	stabbed/slit (e.g. stabbed with a knife, slit open with a machete)	disease (e.g. heart attack, tuberculosis, etc.)	implausible (not clear what happened, maybe murder)
	executed/death sentence (executed by political groups, government forces etc.)	natural disaster (earthquake, volcanic eruption etc.)	n/a (no information found)
